

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

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
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Hello Beaufort!


Now for the Cru Bar where you will most likely be served by Pam, Jamie, Tonya or Ashley. They have

Tax Benefits of HOME **OWNERSHIP**

In tax lingo, your principal residence is the place where you legally reside. It's typically the place where you spend most of your time, but several other factors are also relevant in determining your principal residence. Many of the tax benefits associated with home ownership apply mainly to your principal residence--different rules apply to second homes and investment properties. Here's what you need to know to make owning a home really pay off at tax time.

DEDUCTING MORTGAGE INTEREST

One of the most important tax benefits that comes with owning a home is the fact that you may be able to deduct any mortgage interest that you pay. If you itemize deductions on Schedule A of your federal income tax return, you can generally deduct the interest that you pay on debt resulting from a loan used to buy, build, or improve your home, provided that the loan is secured by your home. In tax terms, this is referred to as "home acquisition debt." You're able to deduct home acquisition debt on a second home as well as your main home (note, however, that when it comes to second homes, special rules apply if you rent the home out for part of the year). The interest that you pay on a qualifying home equity loan or line of credit is generally deductible regardless of how you use the loan proceeds. For more information, see IRS Publication 936.

MORTGAGE INSURANCE

You can generally treat amounts you paid during 2016 for qualified mortgage insurance as home mortgage interest, provided that the insurance was associated with home acquisition debt, and was being paid on an insurance contract issued after 2006. The deduction is phased out, though, if your adjusted gross income was more than \$100,000 (\$50,000 if married filing separately).

DEDUCTING REAL ESTATE PROPERTY TAXES

If you itemize deductions on Schedule A, you can also generally deduct real estate taxes that you've paid on your property in the year that they're paid to the taxing authority. Only the legal property owner can deduct real estate taxes. You cannot deduct homeowner association assessments, since they are not imposed by a state or local government.

TAX TREATMENT OF HOME IMPROVEMENTS AND REPAIRS

Home improvements and repairs are generally nondeductible. 




The Maritime Museum has more Pirates than usual!

John Duncan Junior and Senior GO FISHING!







Jack Gardner Junior and his CARVED DECOYS







I never dreamed decoy carving was in so much demand. or that there were so many enthusiasts! But as I arrived at the 28th Annual Core Sound Decoy Festival this past December at Harkers Island I was amazed in so many ways.

First there was no parking, which was my first surprise as why so many people were attending. Secondly, as I entered into the elementary school and walked around, every room was filled with decoy artists with so many beautiful decoys on display in so many natural settings as well. These decoys, land bird and beach birds stood in driftwood, on stands or by themselves. Thirdly, as a pottery carver I was very impressed with the intricate details of the detailed carvings within these well sculpted pieces of art. And I was over the top impressed with the detailed painting within each bird. Small upon smaller strokes of fine lines, dashes and dots defined each bird's feather and exact details needed for each type of bird.

Jack Gardner Junior is one of those amazing wood carving decoy artists.

I just met Jack last week, even though he is a Beaufort resident. He invited me to his studio and inside his home where I was blown away with his talent not only in decoys, but the beautiful furniture he also makes. This man is multi-talented and I'm talking showcase furniture talented!

As I stood in his home and looked around he showed me all the furniture he made, the house was filled with his work...the kitchen table and hutch, desk, tables...you name it - Jack made it along with the gorgeous built-in book shelfs that housed many of his carvings.

Jack was born into a family that made beautiful furniture and cabinets and he had a next door neighbor that carved decoys... and that's where the love began. He was taught early to hunt and fish, and if he wasn't doing either of those in his spare time he was in the shop playing with wood. He explained, "Back in the day people made or fixed everything they needed. You need a decoy to hunt with - you made it."

As we strolled back to his studio he said, "I prefer to use Tupelo or Juniper as these woods are softer and not to grainy," he says as he picks up the head of a duck and continues to carve the head of his new creation. "I also like to use cork for the bottoms because the ducks float better and more upright than those made from all wood."

"Why is that?" I wondered.

"Because wood doesn't have the same density all the way through so one side maybe heavier than the other, so it tips more to one side." Sounds about right I thought. "Plus they are faster to make, the body is all wood" Jack continued.

He showed me how some ducks are puzzled together - the head and the beak comes off. He also showed me the steps that are involved in starting the carving process. First you need a block of wood the size of the duck you want to make. Then you sketch the side and top view on the block of wood and band saw it out, cutting away everything that doesn't look like a duck. This is also where you would add the 3-D look to it as well. Round it out, sand, prime and paint it and your decoy is complete. Easy right?

Jack prefers to create 'working decoys' instead of the more carved detailed birds because they take

so much time, plus those are really for show. His favorites are local birds like the Red Heads and Scaup (Black Heads). Speaking of shows, Jack only started being competitive when he retired. He prefers just to make them without the competition but has won the 2006 Core Sound Decoy Festival. Among his other wins are the Chesapeake Challenge in Salisbury Maryland, Virginia Beach Wildfowl Show, 2008 and 2012 Rig of Six and the Loon Day of 2011 as well as other honors.

He is really enjoying the new skills he is learning for this project such as angles, and curving of the wood but he still has a tight hold on his carving knife for those well-loved ducks!

healthy living



Unfortunately, sitting has become a popular pastime in recent years. Let's face the facts, walking and bicycling are not used for transportation as much as they were in decades past. With the rise of instant communication (such as social media platforms, texting and email), face-to-face encounters are becoming less frequent. After all, why get up from your office chair if you don't have to? This translates into more time on your rear end. Factor in screen time (television, videogames and hand-held devices), and it's easy to see why sitting is becoming today's go-to choice.



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According to the World Health Organization's 29, 515-day estimate, 29.7% of the time over a person's lifetime is spent sitting while only 0.69% of the time is spent exercising. That's less than 1% of time spent in motion! The perils of passivity are problematic. Increased risks for high blood pressure and even risks for certain forms of cancer are just a couple of the more severe medical conditions that can result from prolonged sitting. The World Health Organization has actually labeled physical inactivity as the fourth-leading risk factor for death globally. In addition, the risk of developing Type 2 diabetes increased by 90% for those who sat for a minimum of eight hours a day. Not to mention that sitting may give you the blues; people who sit more are more likely to be depressed. If those reasons aren't enough to get up and move, consider that cubicle dwellers and couch lovers might suffer from tight hips, soft abs and even an inflexible spine.

Americans spend a staggering nine hours a day sitting. For those glued to the tube, consider that in an eight-and-a-half-year study, people who watched the most TV had a 61% risk of dying (in comparison with those who tuned in for an hour each day).

Fortunately, it's never too late to change. Even sitting on a stability ball will activate your core muscles. Or consider purchasing a treadmill desk. Walk while you work to burn calories, boost endorphins, improve circulation, and avoid the pitfalls of sitting. If that isn't an option, get up every 30 minutes to stretch your legs. Take a trip to the water cooler, fetch a document from the printer, or just connect for some real face time with co-workers. Consider even having work meetings while walking if that's a possibility.

Simple changes today can result in better health tomorrow. Maintain an active lifestyle as much as possible. In an age of increased sedentary activity, why sit when you can stand? Or better yet, walk or even jog? The point is to just get moving. Improve your health by putting your body in motion!
